## **OPPD President & CEO Tim Burke to retire in July** Internal search for replacement is underway.

After 24 years at OPPD, the past six as president and

chief executive officer, Timothy J. Burke has announced his retirement, effective July 2. Burke took over as the utility's 12th CEO in 2015.

Burke said as part of the utility's succession planning, he began thinking about when the "right" time to retire would be.

The fact that he has a sixth grandchild on the way – hundreds of miles away on the East Coast – also played a big part in his decision. He will continue with his community leadership work, he said.

"Looking back at what we set out to accomplish five years ago, we have done what we have said we would do and have set up the organization extremely well," said Burke.

"This isn't a CEO driving it, this is the entire organization doing so. We are doing things other electric companies and utilities would like to do. We are truly leading the way in so many different ways. I'm incredibly proud of the work we've done."

### **Solid footing**

Burke cited the strategic initiative and directive work done over the past five years with setting that course. OPPD is sound financially, thanks to the process improvement planning and generation work, and the system is resilient, as evidenced by how it has handled flooding, the derecho windstorm, polar vortex and other weather threats.

And the utility has been recognized for strides made in its focus on its customers and lauded nationally as one of the country's top economic development utilities.

That customer focus has been a big part of Burke's work, making sure existing customers grow and thrive, while also drawing new companies to the area by being proactive partners in growing the region.

Burke said he takes great pride in the utility's safety record. 2020 was OPPD's safest year on record, despite

many changes in the work environment across the district due to the pandemic.

### **Community and industry involvement**

Burke, who joined OPPD in 1997 as vice president of Energy Services, leaves a strong legacy of enterprise-wide initiatives, strong strategic planning, cost-management, improving employee engagement and community leadership.

Throughout his career, he has remained active in local and industry organizations. His recent involvement includes the American Public Power Association, Large Public Power Council, Nebraska Power Association, Business Ethics Alliance Trustee, past chair and Executive Committee member – Greater Omaha Chamber of Commerce, and the United Way of the Midlands.

### Internal search underway

The OPPD Board of Directors plans to choose a replacement for Burke from within the district's ranks, an endorsement of the current state of affairs in the utility and the job Burke has done since becoming CEO.

The board has indicated the search for Burke's replacement will be a thorough and transparent one, and the goal is to have that person hired by the end of May. That would enable the next CEO to spend time working with Burke on the transition before his July retirement date.

The public was able to provide input about the leadership qualities they wish to see in OPPD's next CEO
