

First Quarter 2021 Financial Report

PURPOSE

Report the quarterly financial results to the Board of Directors

FACTS

- a. The first quarter 2021 financial results are attached for review. The results are unaudited.
- b. Retail Revenue for the first quarter 2021 was \$243.0 million, which was \$18.4 million over budget. Off-system Revenue was \$178.7 million, which was \$144.7 million over budget. Other Income was \$4.8 million, which was \$11.3 million under budget.
- c. Operations and Maintenance Expense (less Fuel and Purchased Power) for the first quarter 2021 was \$98.9 million, which was \$1.6 million over budget. Fuel and Purchased Power Expense was \$296.3 million, which was \$209.3 million over budget. Other Expense was \$98.3 million, which was \$1.3 million over budget.
- d. Operating Income (loss) for the first quarter 2021 was (\$45.9) million, which was \$50.8 million under budget.
- e. Net Income (loss) for the first quarter 2021 was (\$66.9) million, which was \$60.3 million under budget.






Cash Balance ◆


Net Income ◆

SD Impact:

* **SD-2 Rates** - The District is maintaining its commitment to no general rate increase through 2021. The 2020 average retail rate was 9.8% below the regional retail average rates, based on preliminary EIA data.

* **SD-3 Access to Credit Markets** - The 12-month rolling debt service coverage ratio is 1.64 times through March 2021, and is forecasted at 2.0 times at year end. The District's days of cash on hand is 199 days as of March 31, 2021. The District will continue to monitor the financial impacts related to the COVID-19 pandemic and the February Polar Vortex weather event.

HIGHLIGHTS:

* Retail revenues were over budget year-to-date (YTD) by 8.2%, or \$18.4 million, primarily due to the Polar Vortex weather event in February, particularly in the industrial category. Off-system sales were over budget YTD by \$144.8 million, due to higher market prices during February's Polar Vortex weather event.

* Fuel and purchased power expenses were over budget YTD by \$209.3 million, primarily due to higher prices and higher volumes, especially during February's Polar Vortex weather event.

* Capital expenditures were under budget YTD by 37.7%, or \$27.3 million, due to delayed spending primarily on Power with Purpose projects. The Company actively monitors project timelines and expects spending to increase later in the year up to the budgeted amount.

Retirement Plan – First Quarter 2021

PURPOSE

To Report the Retirement Plan Fund's First Quarter 2021 Performance Results

FACTS

- a. The Retirement Plan Fund market value at the end of the first quarter was \$1.17 billion. This compares to the market value at the beginning of the quarter of \$1.16 billion. During the quarter, employee contributions were \$3.53 million and OPPD contributions totaled \$15.1 million. Benefit payments totaled \$26.6 million and the investment market value (net of expenses) increased by \$18.04 million.
- b. As of March 31, 2021, the Retirement Fund asset allocation was 56.0% Equity, 37.4% Fixed Income and 6.6% Alternative Assets, which is within the Investment Policy Guidelines approved by the Board.
- c. The Retirement Plan Fund sector performance (net of fees) was:

- d. All equity markets experienced first quarter gains. US Markets led developed international and emerging markets. The Domestic Equity Index returned 6.6%. Value stocks outperformed growth and small capitalizations outperformed large capitalizations. The International Equity Index returned 3.4% despite some challenges in Covid-19 pandemic recovery.

The Domestic Fixed Income Index returned -2.6%. U.S. high yield performed the strongest and U.S. investment grade performed the weakest. The Global Fixed Income Index returned -5.5%. Global central banks have implemented more stimulus measures to counteract the pandemic.

The Real Estate Index returned 1.8% with industrial returns surpassing retail and other property types.





SD-3: Access to Credit Markets

In order to achieve a low cost and flexible cost structure, OPPD shall maintain financial ratios and targets to ensure efficient and cost effective access to the credit markets.

Therefore:

- For OPPD's annual budgets the Board establishes a minimum total debt service coverage* ratio of 2.0 times.
- When making resource decisions, OPPD shall take into consideration long-term revenue requirements, debt to equity ratios, minimum risk adjusted liquidity* levels, competitive position, financial risk and financial flexibility.
- OPPD's goal is to maintain an AA credit rating with the credit rating agencies consistent with the above expectations.


*TERMS AND DEFINITIONS

Total Debt Service Coverage: Revenues less expenses divided by total annual senior and subordinate lien debt interest and principal payments.

Liquidity: Total cash (operating and supplemental cash accounts) and unrestricted lines of credit available to meet ongoing daily cash requirements.

Total Debt Service Coverage


For OPPD's annual budgets, the Board established a minimum total debt service coverage ratio of 2.0 times.





* Share of debt to total capitalization (debt plus net position)


Days Liquidity

Polar Vortex Considerations

OPPD is well-positioned financially to manage polar vortex impacts

- Cash on hand is sufficient to operate for almost six months
- Requested increase in bank line of credit offers additional financial flexibility
- AA rating allows lower cost access to credit markets
- Preliminary discussions with credit rating agencies indicate no change to OPPD's credit ratings





Sarpy Southwest Transmission Routing, Siting & Public Involvement Process











Final Transmission Routes







PURPOSE

Authorize use of eminent domain as necessary to acquire permanent easements, temporary easements, and/or fee ownership of land for electric transmission facilities and substations that are initiated through December 31, 2022.

FACTS

- a. This requested eminent domain authorization covers land rights that need to be acquired for energy delivery infrastructure to connect generation resources to the transmission grid, support load growth, and enhance grid reliability.
- b. This request does not extend to the acquisition of land rights for energy production infrastructure.
- c. It may be necessary to acquire fee ownership of land for substation facilities. Permanent easements are required for the construction, operation and maintenance of transmission facilities. Temporary easements may be required for pre-engineering survey access as well as temporary construction needs.
- d. There will be stakeholder engagement throughout the land rights acquisition process.
- e. OPPD will commence negotiations during the summer of 2021 to voluntarily acquire the necessary land rights for transmission facilities and substations.
- f. OPPD will undertake reasonable efforts to voluntarily acquire the necessary land rights. However, the use of eminent domain may be necessary if voluntary agreement cannot be achieved by the District and landowners.
- g. Management will report the filing of eminent domain actions to the Board.
- h. This requested authorization extends through December 31, 2022. Additional authorizations after that date for the covered projects will be requested, as needed.

Construction and Maintenance

After all the proper rights are secured, the construction phase of the project will commence. Access routes are determined and vegetation is cleared in order to construct our transmission facilities. Construction includes drilling and setting foundations, raising structures, stringing and energizing the line.

Once construction is complete, the Right-of-Way Agent will settle construction related damages that may have occurred.

In order to ensure reliable operation, periodic inspections, maintenance and repair may be necessary. It is our practice to notify landowners when we plan to clear trees, inspect transmission line equipment or perform other maintenance activities in our rights-of-way. Notification may be in the form of a letter, door hanger or phone call.

TRANSMISSION EASEMENT ACQUISITION



Depending on the size and location of a project, OPPD follows state statutes which outline a process to notify and inform affected landowners when negotiating easements and right-of-way.

Right-of-Way and Easements

An easement is an interest in private property that gives OPPD the right to use, not own, the right-of-way (ROW) for the specific purpose of safely constructing, operating and maintaining its facilities. The easement runs with the land and is recorded with the Register of Deeds in your county to become permanent record.

There are many reasons that OPPD places its facilities on private property. Some of the reasons include, protecting rate payers from costs associated with facility relocations and to control the area surrounding the facilities to insure safe clearances and deter incompatible uses.

Several factors enter into determining the width of transmission line easements, including voltage, structure design and location of the line with proximity to existing roadways. Lines carrying higher voltages require greater widths to ensure proper clearances. Transmission lines along

roadways will utilize the road right of way as part of the easement width.

Many land uses are allowed within the easement which do not interfere with safe operation of the transmission line such as cultivating and grazing livestock. However, some uses are restricted including structures, buildings, haystacks, trees, brush and burning of any nature. Changes in grade require prior written approval from OPPD.

An easement also allows OPPD the reasonable right to access the ROW. In addition to the easement payment, damages to growing crops or property will be reimbursed to the landowner and/or his/her tenant.

Landowner cooperation is critical to keep ROW corridors safe, prevent injury, and minimize property and environmental damage.

Determining Fair Market Value and Just Compensation

Prior to easement negotiations, OPPD typically hires an independent certified appraiser familiar with the area.

The appraiser will evaluate the impact of the easement on the property, specific characteristics of the property and recent comparable sales to determine the opinion of value.

OPPD will use the opinion of value to justly compensate landowners for damages to the fair market value of the property on which the easement is placed. The process is equitable to all landowners.

Negotiating Easement and Right-of-Way

OPPD will work to arrive at a mutually satisfactory agreement. Depending on the size and location of a project, OPPD follows state statutes which outline a process to notify and inform affected landowners.

Throughout the negotiation process a landowner can seek legal representation, obtain their own appraisal, negotiate and accept or reject any offer. If an agreement cannot be reached, a landowner cannot be located or there are title issues associated with a parcel, the condemnation process can be utilized through OPPD's statutory rights of eminent domain.

PURPOSE


The Nuclear Oversight Committee provides a regular oversight of items related to the Fort Calhoun Station (FCS) nuclear plant.

FACTS

In addition to safe and secure dry cask storage of fuel, the required Preventative Maintenance tasks and Surveillance Tests, the following major decommissioning activities were conducted in April:

- All buildings within the Deconstruction Area at the station have been turned over to our contract partner for eventual demolition. The warehouse has been reduced to ground level. Preparations to begin deconstruction of other structures are underway including the removal of universal waste.
- The waste processing structure and rail spur work is complete. The first batch of rail cars arrived on site and will be used to begin our bulk waste shipment campaign. Shipments to this point have been performed via over the road transportation.
- The Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) conducted the required second quarter inspection, which included a facility tour. This evaluation consisted of criteria contained in two inspection procedures. No findings or violations were noted. The NRC will return in July for the third quarter inspection and to discuss the License Termination Plan.

Summary of Q2 Customer First Solutions

- Maintain flexible bill payment options to help customers financially








- Sen. Joe Manchin (D-WV), a key Senate swing vote, expressed support for the GOP package
- Most other Democratic policymakers are likely to oppose the plan, in part because it includes substantially lower funding levels than the American Jobs Plan
