

Registration is open for the 17th annual Heat the Streets Run & Walk for Warmth. Co-hosted by OPPD and Metropolitan Utilities District, the event is Saturday, March 2, at Aksarben Village in Omaha.

Participants will begin at Zone 6 in Aksarben Village. Events include timed 5K and 10K runs and an untimed walk. The timed events will begin at 9 a.m., with the untimed walk immediately to follow. A virtual option is also available at a location of your own choosing.

OPPD board approves rate proposal to promote reliability

OPPD's board of directors has approved a new, \$2.1 billion budget with a modest general rate increase to help maintain robust, reliable electrical service amid rising costs and growing customer demand.

The exact increase for 2024 will vary based on the type of customer and their usage, but the average among different customer classes would be 2.5%. Most residential customers would see a 1.6% increase.

The new budget will allow OPPD to continue upgrading its infrastructure to improve reliability while adding new programs that give customers more control over their energy use.

OPPD's retail rates were 26.5% below the national average in 2022, according to the Energy Information Administration. The increase will maintain OPPD's competitive edge while preserving the health of the utility's operations.

The new rates go into effect on

Jan. 1 as part of OPPD's Corporate Operating Plan.

-Tax incentives can help with winter home improvements

Winter's upcoming arrival is welcome news for those who love the holiday season, snow days or sitting in front of the fire.

Of course, the cold can also hit people's pocketbooks in the form of higher heating bills.

But tax credits and rebates can help ease that burden, including incentives available under the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022 (IRA). The IRA offers a wide range of tax credits for home improvements and upgrades. Among the improvements covered: heat pumps, windows and exterior doors, and insulation.

The IRA is touted as one of the largest investments in clean energy in the nation's history. Various tax credits through the IRA are available through 2032.

Upgrading your home's heat and cooling system can have a sizable impact on your bill. Incentives for new

electric or natural gas heat pumps are as big as \$2,000.

A home energy audit can evaluate your home's energy efficiency. A maximum \$600 credit is available for such audits.

Incentives of up to \$2,000 are also available for qualifying customer-owned solar systems. More details are available at **oppd.com**.
